Frequently Asked Questions about Oxford South's (Norwich, Otterville, Springford) Boil Water Advisory

Why do we have a boil water advisory in Oxford South?

The boil water advisory was issued by Southwestern Public Health. This advisory is being issued as a precautionary measure after a water sample from the Norwich Water Tower had microbiological lab results indicating that the test was inconclusive for *E. Coli* and *Total Coliform* due to non-target bacterial overgrowth. The Tower was one of 12 samples collected in the municipal water system.

The County investigates all instances of adverse water quality. When reviewing the recent sample results, all 5 wells in service in Oxford South are free of *E. coli and total coliform*. All 4 water samples from the distribution system were also free of *E. coli and total coliform*. All 2 remaining water treatment facility sample results were free of E coli and total coliform. The Otterville water treatment facilities are not currently in service.

Is all of Oxford South affected by the advisory?

All residents and businesses connected to the Oxford South municipal water supply (Norwich, Otterville, Springford) are impacted by the advisory. How long will the boil water advisory be in effect?

The first set of confirmatory bacteriological samples were collected on June 4, 2025 and a second set of Bacteriological samples will be collected June 5, 2025 to ensure the water is safe to drink. It takes 24 hours for a lab to process bacteria samples for drinking water. This delay is necessary to allow the sample to incubate.

This advisory will remain in effect until both sets of water samples (taken 24 hours apart) indicate there is no risk to the public.

How did you let people know about the boil water advisory?

Oxford County staff posted Boil Water Advisory Notices to high traffic areas in the community. In addition, Oxford County Communications and Southwestern Public Health notified citizens about the boil water advisory as soon as it was announced. Information was shared with the public using a variety of traditional and digital channels.
